

Ways to qualify for financial aid with no high school diploma through ATB

- Students first enrolled in an eligible postsecondary program **before July 1, 2012**, can enroll in an eligible program and establish eligibility by one of the alternatives listed below:
 - a. Passing a Department of Education-approved Ability to Benefit (ATB) Test.
 - b. Completing at least six college-level credit hours toward a federal student aid-eligible degree or certificate offered by Lewis & Clark (The coursework does not have to apply to the specific degree or program in which the student is enrolled.).
 - c. Completing the State of Illinois process.
- Students first enrolled in an eligible postsecondary program on or after July 1, 2012, can only establish eligibility through one of the alternatives above if the student is enrolled in an eligible career pathway program (34 CFR 668.157). Interested students can inquire about the Ability to Benefit Program through Lewis & Clark's <u>Financial Aid</u> office and <u>Adult Education</u>.

The Ability to Benefit (ATB) program allows students without a high school diploma to qualify for financial aid to pay for courses that are part of a career pathway program at Lewis & Clark.
