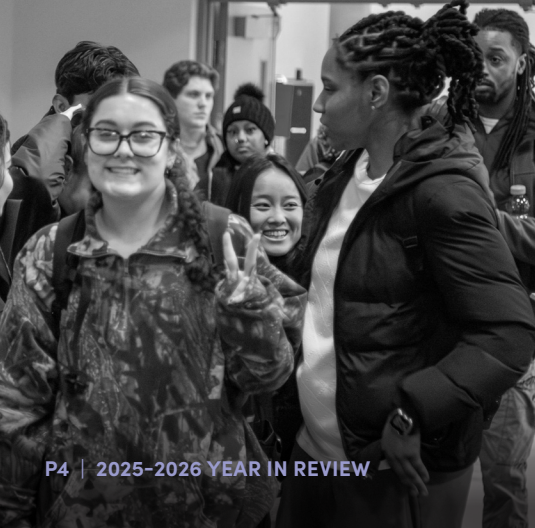

KEY DIRECTION 1

CREATE ENROLLMENT & RETENTION IMPROVEMENT

Enrollment and retention efforts this year focused on more multimedia creation, meeting prospective students where they are, and promoting the college’s PACE course modes. Billable credit hours totaled 55,116 (as of April 28, 2026), representing a decrease from last year’s 58,021, but a 1.1 percent increase from our post-pandemic baseline of 54,514 (FY22). Student headcount for Fall 2025 totaled 4,498, representing a 2.3 percent decrease from Fall 2024 (4,606), but a 9.0 percent increase from our post-pandemic baseline of 4,125 (Fall 2021). LC’s IPEDS full-time retention rate from Fall 2024 to Fall 2025 was 67 percent.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Expanded outreach to non-traditional prospective students through targeted lookbooks, updated displays at local job centers, and through the creation of a “Recruitment Roadtrip” initiative focused on meeting community members and potential students in high-traffic community locations. A schedule is in development and the events will begin this summer.
- Added participation in the Jersey County Fair Parade—a well-attended northern county event—to the recruitment schedule to expand community visibility.
- Established multiple PACE coach roles (two full-time, one part-time) and a communication plan for bi-weekly outreach (email, phone, in-person) to support student success. Also formed an advisory group with instructors to enhance the PACE experience.
- Invested in a training contract with Ferrelli for Enrollment Center team members to learn how to better utilize Ellucian’s Recruit CRM.
- Hired a recruiter, who began work on re-establishing a communications plan for moving prospective students through the application and enrollment process.
- Hired a new Media Specialist to focus on social media and the creation of multimedia content in support of enrollment and student retention.
- Developed and initiated a targeted marketing plan for the college’s PACE programs, focused on educating campus and community audiences. Efforts include an explainer video in progress, a website quiz tool, and a guide by PACE Success Coaches to help advisors and instructors determine student fit.



KEY DIRECTION 2

INVEST IN PROGRAM AND CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT

Goals of KD2 include the development of new courses, new programs, and short-term certificates. The assessment and improvement of student learning at various levels (course, program and institution) is also prioritized. Modes of instruction for LC courses are continually analyzed and enhanced in an effort to maximize equity for our student.

- Creation of a new Paraprofessional Training course
- Creation of a new Phlebotomy Training course
- Curriculum development for a new Sheet Metal Fabrication course
- Curriculum development for a new Upholstery & Trim course
- Offering three new Avionics courses
- ICCB approval of an LPN program
- HLC approval of a PACE mode for Child Development
- Creation of new PACE courses in Criminal Justice, Literature, Math and Biology
- Continued participation in the HLC Assessment Academy
- Creation of Faculty Grand Rounds
- Piloting a new Annual Program Review process
- Awarded \$360,000 in state-funded grants to expand capabilities in Welding and continue offerings in Paraprofessional and Phlebotomy
- \$100,000 grant awarded to strengthen Access and Equity in Dual Credit initiatives.

KEY DIRECTION 3

IMPROVE INTERNAL *and* EXTERNAL STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT

LC has experienced increased participation from team members, students, and community members. This growth has led to deeper engagement and provides multiple ways to access the campus community and positively impact our culture.

Culture Survey Participation:

- Participation increased by 27%, with 308 team members responding.
- Results show consistently strong ratings across all categories.

Team Member and Student Engagement:

- Team members are being recognized with Trailblazer Tokens for displaying our core values: Diversity and Inclusion, Student-Focused, Integrity, Valuing People, Responsibility, and Building Community Relationships.
- An increased number of KD Cup events were held and met with consistent enthusiasm and high participation.
- New initiatives included the successful launch of Trailblazers Unified and the KD Cup Wellness Program.

Alumni Engagement:

- Alumni Association membership increased 38% to 1,081 members.
- The Alumni Facebook Group grew to 1,700 active members.
- Expanded outreach efforts through campaigns such as Giving Tuesday.

External Stakeholder Engagement:

- The Campus and Community Connect event exceeded its attendance goals and generated valuable feedback for future activities.
- A Capital Campaign Feasibility Study has been completed in partnership with the Lewis and Clark Community College Foundation.

KEY DIRECTION 4

INVEST IN DATA *and* TECHNOLOGY TRANSFORMATION

Over the past year, KD4 focused on strengthening the college's technology foundation while moving from planning to execution across cybersecurity, governance, analytics, and service delivery. With key frameworks now established, KD4 delivered measurable improvements that enhanced security, improved operational efficiency, and positioned the college for long term sustainability.

HIGHLIGHTS

Significant Cost Avoidance and Modernization:

- Migrated the Helpdesk call center to a modern, cloud based platform, avoiding an end of life upgrade and generating more than \$50,000 in savings over five years.

Resilient and High Availability Infrastructure:

- Modernized core infrastructure with enhanced server virtualization capacity and a new redundant firewall architecture that doubled internet bandwidth and eliminated a critical single point of failure.

Strategic Transition to Power BI:

- Initiated the transition to Microsoft Power BI, resulting in \$21,000 in annual savings, while improving platform sustainability, scalability, and alignment with existing infrastructure.

Dashboard Enhancements and Data Transparency:

- Enhanced existing dashboards, delivered new dashboards, and launched a centralized Data Insights webpage to improve visibility into institutional data.
- Strengthened access to timely, decision supporting information for leadership and campus stakeholders while reinforcing a culture of data informed planning.

Expanded Microsoft 365 Capabilities:

- Increased access to Microsoft 365 tools for team members and students, including Microsoft Copilot, Bookings, and enhanced collaboration features.

Stronger Cybersecurity Posture:

- Implemented cybersecurity policies approved in prior years, supported by active risk tracking informed by threat intelligence and internal reviews.

- Improved IT Governance, Automation, and Service Excellence
- Created 35+ digital forms to replace manual and paper based processes, streamlining workflows and reducing processing time across departments.
- Implemented standardized procedures to ensure timely operating system and software updates across 2,200+ computers, strengthening security, reliability, and system performance campus-wide.

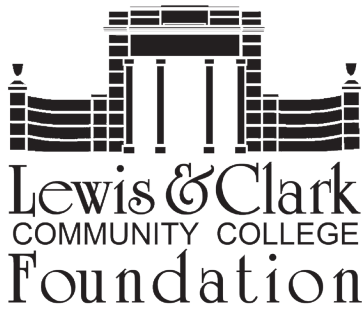
Campus Engagement and Open Communication

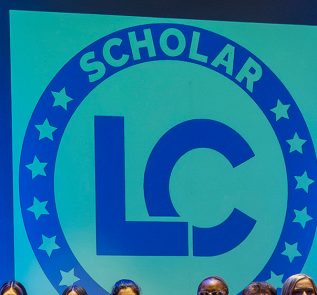
