## Lucy's Gift - A Moment in History

The morning after Monticello College burned in 1888, six-year-old Lucy Stowell heard her parents discussing the tragedy and insisted her parents take her over to the school so she could see for herself what had happened. Upon arriving, Lucy noticed Harriet standing off to one side, surveying the smoldering remnants of the building, wandered over to her, and slipped a quarter into her hand. Lucy had originally intended to give it to her church that Sunday morning, but decided that Ms. Haskell "needed it more than the heathens did." Lucy would be credited with the first donation toward rebuilding Monticello, and Harriet commissioned a stained-glass window created in her honor that can be seen on the second floor from the front lawn. The bottom of it says "LUCY."
