




## 2002 Hall of Fame Inductees



### ***Staci Dowdy***

Staci Dowdy was the first player to bring national recognition to the Lewis and Clark women's soccer program. Dowdy scored 14 goals and 12 assists for 40 points in 1995 and followed with 23 goals and 17 assists for 61 points in 1996. She was named to the all-District team both years, earned National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) and National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) second-team, all-America honors in 1995 and first-team NJCAA and NSCAA all-America honors in 1996. Dowdy was the school's first-ever National Player of the Year recipient in 1996.

Dowdy went on to play soccer for Saint Louis University.



### ***Ed Huneke***

Ed Huneke served 10 years as coach of the Lewis and Clark soccer program. Under his leadership, Lewis and Clark won seven regional titles, made six appearances in the National Junior College Athletic Association's (NJCAA) national tournament and earned one championship game berth. Huneke coached 19 all-America players and three of his former athletes have reached the professional level.


Huneke now serves as the head coach of the Southern Illinois University - Edwardsville Men's Soccer Program, where he continues to recruit and coach some of the finest athletes in the country.



### ***Jason Isringhausen***

The St. Louis Cardinal's pitching staff is bolstered by one of Lewis and Clark's finest: Jason Isringhausen, who recorded a 5-3 record as a pitcher for Lewis and Clark. The Brighton native played centerfield and was counted on for his productive bat. On the mound, Isringhausen posted a 3.20 ERA in 35 innings and collected 36 strikeouts. He was drafted out of Lewis and Clark by the New York Mets and was later traded to Oakland, where he became one of the American League's dominant relief pitchers.


Since joining the Cardinals in 2002, Isringhausen has proven to be one of the most dominant weapons on the mound and is the number one player called upon in all save situations.



### ***Rob LaMarsh***

Rob LaMarsh joined the Lewis and Clark Men's Baseball Team as a pitcher/first baseman. As a pitcher for the Trailblazers, LaMarsh posted a 12-4 record with a 3.09 ERA and smashed 22 homeruns. He was a double threat because of his arm and his bat. LaMarsh was named to the all-Region team in 1996, during his final season with the Trailblazers.

Following his pitching career with Lewis and Clark, LaMarsh went on to Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville, where he was a pitcher and a designated hitter. LaMarsh was then signed by the Texas Rangers. He also played two seasons with the River City Rascals.



### ***Kirk Moser***

Kirk Moser helped his brother make the Moser name legendary in the Lewis and Clark soccer program. Kirk Moser recorded 13 goals and 14 assists for 40 points in 1987 and added 21 goals and 10 assists for 52 points in 1988. He was named Most Valuable Player in Region 24, earned all-Region, all-District, National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) and the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) all-America honors in both 1987 and 1988.

Kirk followed in his brother's footsteps, continuing his college play at Sangamon State, before signing to play with the St. Louis Steamers, where he currently plays.



### ***Mark Moser***

After nearly 20 years, Mark Moser continues to be the all-time leading scorer for the Lewis and Clark Men's Soccer Team. Moser scored 25 goals and eight assists for 58 points in 1984, and followed with 26 goals and six assists for 58 points in 1985. His 51 goals and 116 points are both tops for any scorer at Lewis and Clark. He was named to the all-Region, all-District and National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) all-America honors in 1985.

Moser went on to excel in soccer at Sangamon State. Moser began his indoor professional soccer career in 1988-1989 with the Dayton Dynamo. He has also played professionally with the Indiana Kick from 1989-1990, the St. Louis Storm from 1991-1992, and the St. Louis Ambush from 1992-1999. Today he plays with the St. Louis Steamers.



### ***John Stahl***

John Stahl was a National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) all-America goalkeeper for the Lewis and Clark Trailblazer's Men's Soccer Team, setting an outstanding pace that all goalkeepers attempt to surpass. Stahl posted 10 shutouts during the 1982 season, and earned all-America recognition in 1983 when he posted 14 shutouts in the regular season. He was also named to the all-Region and all-NJCAA teams in 1982 and 1983.

Stahl went on to play soccer at University of Missouri-St. Louis, where he received all-America status both years. Stahl was drafted in 1985 by the St. Louis Steamers, but ended up playing for the Toledo Pride for one year. He currently works and lives in South Carolina.
