- Ask your high school office to have your **official transcript** sent to Lewis and Clark Community College, Enrollment Center, 5800 Godfrey Road, Godfrey, IL 62035.

If you do not have a copy of your special education documentation (IEP, 504 and/or testing reports), please have your Special Education office send your documentation using one of the following options:

Using high school transcripts, special education documentation and additional testing (if indicated), a student may choose one of the following options:

1. **College for Life Program:** These students have had few inclusive experiences in high school and want to continue their education and expand their social growth opportunities with peers on a college campus. All CFL students are required to take a minimum of three classes, which includes Self-Advocacy and two others of choice. These classes are continuing education, non-credit courses which are not eligible for financial aid or support from the Division of Rehabilitation Services, and follow the same payment policies as all other continuing education courses.
2. **Supported College Transition Program:** These students have some mainstreaming experience in high school and have test scores that indicate they can be successful in smaller sections of college courses, developmental and/or college level, with the additional support provided by a college transition class and Study Skills class. All of these courses are college credit courses which are eligible for federal and state financial aid.
3. **Accessibility Services:** These students have been mainstreamed in regular education classes during high school, especially in English and Math, and may continue to need additional support in order to be successful in college courses. The student is responsible for disclosing a disability and requesting the need for accommodations.
